

To the Class of 2022

When we look back on the impressive results in this booklet from the Class of 2022, there is so much to be proud of.

Their hard work over the past few years is reflected in their outstanding achievements across three credentials – HSC, VET and the IB Diploma – and across a broad range of subjects.

Within the HSC, there are many students who have excelled. This includes a first in the state for English Extension 2, fourth in the state for PDHPE, fifth in the state for Modern Greek Continuers and eighth in the state for Earth and Environmental Science. With thousands of students studying these courses across NSW, these results are remarkable.

Then there are our 14 students nominated or selected for exhibition in HSC Showcases. Hours upon hours of careful thought and dedicated work went into crafting extraordinary scripts, posters, performances, art works and furniture.

Our IB cohort also performed with great strength across their subjects, with our mean score sitting at 37.6 (ATAR equivalent of 95.75). An extraordinary result compared with the averages across Australia (35.6) and the world (30.9). We particularly highlight the fact that almost half of the cohort achieved a score of 40 or more, with two of these students accomplishing a perfect score.

We equally celebrate every single student who achieved his HSC credential, IB Diploma or VET qualification. We are proud of each one who sought extra feedback to improve an essay, who completed practice papers and listened to advice and who didn't give up when learning was challenging. It is these actions which set young people up for life.

In a year of record early entry offers, the cohort also achieved the highest average ATAR since it was introduced in 2009, at 82.54.

The Class of 2022 – and their peers across the state – should be congratulated for their achievements under challenging circumstances. They spent their last term of Year 11 and the first few weeks of their HSC course in lockdown. Their perseverance is a credit to their resilience and determination.

We trust you will enjoy reading and celebrating the achievements of our students, as well as their insights and reflections. They are an impressive group and we congratulate them on a wonderful year. We are so excited to see what they do next.







IB perfection for Kyan and Sam

Kyan McLean and Sam Jackson both received 45 out of a possible 45 IB points. Here they share the secrets to their success.



Kyan McLean

Whilst hard work is important to success, the people that you choose to surround yourself with are infinitely more so. I never would've been able to keep myself going during this time if it weren't for the friends that I had by my side in class, at lunch and on those late nights spent at the library. I surrounded myself with supportive people – and ensured I made myself a supportive person to the people around me.

There is a belief that you must sacrifice the parts of your life that make you happy if you want to succeed with your marks. This isn't true – I know that the times I worked the best were when I had something to look forward to soon. You don't have to put your lives on hold for a year; you're still allowed to play sport, try out for a lead in a senior production and see your friends on Saturday nights – these are the parts of Year 12 that you'll always remember.

Sam Jackson

I planned in great detail everything I wanted to achieve in a certain study block (could be an entire day or a short hour), which allowed me to maintain accountability and easily keep track of what I achieved. I wrote down everything I wanted to achieve in a day immediately after I woke up on a whiteboard in front of my desk. I made sure that the tasks I enjoyed the least were first. To aid in achieving these tasks I utilised an app on my phone that locked me out until I completed what I set out to do. Furthermore, recall and spaced repetition flashcards are the greatest way to remember content over long periods of time and I made sure to utilise the best resource I had available – my teachers – as much as possible.

Planning everything I wanted to achieve (from homework tasks to sport training to going to the beach with friends) allowed for better time management and maximised the number of things I could juggle in my life.





Liam Carriline's improvement during his IB studies was so great he was awarded the Carl Salomon Prize for Significant Improvement at the Prize Giving ceremony at the ICC in December.

For Liam, it helped that he was fascinated by the subjects offered by the IB.

'I found the curriculum really captivating, which helped in motivating me to do work and stay focused,' he said. 'The IB curriculum also places emphasis on incorporating global issues and mindsets which I found extremely interesting and beneficial.'

The global focus of the IB inspired Liam to choose to study commerce and international relations at ANU in Canberra from 2023.

He knew the IB would be challenging but this '...pushed him to work hard and consistently stay focused' while still taking time to enjoy sports training and spending time with friends.

Head of IB Miss Cheryl Priest hailed Liam's growth.

'Liam grew to embody the characteristics of the IB learner profile in a manner that impressed his teachers and peers, gaining the highest respect for his integrity, curiosity, strong work ethic and resilience.'

Liam was similarly impressed with College staff, saying, 'The staff and support network were also fantastic, which made a challenging two years a lot easier and more enjoyable.'

His open-mindedness and communication with staff, Miss Priest believes, were vital to his improvement.

'Liam made the choice to open his mind to everything. He valued his learning experiences and constantly sought feedback, which he followed, achieving an effective balance between being self-directed and knowing when to ask for help and advice.'

Liam's academic improvement was clear, but his personal qualities also blossomed during 2022.

'Of greatest merit were his care for others and the empathetic, compassionate way he looked out for his peers and friends, his teachers and family and his community. We are immensely proud of what Liam was able to achieve academically, but more so of the person that he has become.' Miss Priest said.


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Strong showing in showcases and exhibitions

Outstanding works in Drama, Visual Arts, Music and Industrial Technology are celebrated in the annual HSC showcases and exhibitions (OnSTAGE, ARTEXPRESS, ENCORE, InTech).

In 2022, 14 Newington students achieved 12 nominations and three selections. George Evans and William Hyland-Falle were selected in the OnSTAGE exhibition at the Seymour Centre from 6 to 10 February 2023 and Oscar Tentij was selected for the ARTEXPRESS exhibition at Hazelhurst Arts Centre in Gymea from 11 February to 10 April 2023.

Individual Project: Poster Promotion, *Death and the Maiden*, selected for inclusion.

William's design concept explores how music can trigger emotional experiences of the past. *Death and the Maiden* investigates the horrific actions that took place behind closed government doors in Chile during the Augusto Pinochet regime and how these experiences left a painful imprint on the lives of many.

William says, 'Abuse of authority are by no means 'foreign' concepts to us as Australian citizens. We are beginning to face the music of our own shortcomings as a nation. It's a disturbing melody, but one we all need to listen to.'

Individual Project: Scriptwriting, *How to Lift a Metal Beam*, selected for inclusion.

George's individual scriptwriting project, the play *How to Lift a Metal Beam*, was written in the style of absurdism and explores how we as a society approach the problems of today.

The characters in his play find themselves grappling with a physical and existential problem; a large metal beam that is too heavy to budge, or nudge. The opinions of the 'old guard' are weighed against the new. Should new progressive solutions be considered or is it easier to ignore the problem and leave it for others to solve? It becomes clear as the play progresses that Jim's beam is representative of something bigger – it serves as a metaphor for the immovable problems that we face as a society.


'I was inspired to address a growing sense of inaction in the way society deals with the problems of today such as climate change and government corruption.' George said.

Individual Project: Poster Promotion, *Death of a Salesman*, nominated for inclusion.

William's poster design concept for *Death of a Salesman* explores the central character's (Willy Loman) disillusioned and nightmarish version of reality. 'I chose to focus on the play as tragedy – Willy's constant desire for an unattainable wealth that increasingly skews his consciousness and perception of reality, affecting his surroundings, relationships and self,' William said.

Cladonia Rangiferina, selected for inclusion.

Oscar used moss that grows natively in the Swedish archipelago in *Cladonia Rangiferina* and overlaid architectural diagrams that have been footnoted with corresponding, relevant information about the moss's history and use. The transparent acrylic handrail filled with moss beneath the artwork is a symbol of support and strength for the viewer.

Individual Project: Individual Performance, *The Maniac*, nominated for inclusion.

Oscar adapted Dario Fo's play *Accidental Death of an Anarchist* into a solo performance piece. He drew inspiration from the Italian form Commedia dell'arte in his characterisation, combining mime and physical comedy to enhance Fo's satire of police corruption in Italy during the 1970s.

Nicholas' directorial vision for the play *Black Diggers* investigates the unacknowledged truths and untold stories of Indigenous Australian Diggers throughout Australian War History. In this imagined production, Nicholas fuses Brechtian political theatre techniques with verbatim theatre approaches to give voice to previously unheard stories and experiences.

Tambour Desk, nominated for inclusion.

Fletcher's Major Work is an outstanding piece of fine furniture. He created two components for his work: an American walnut, American oak and ringed gidgee shaker-style desk and accompanying tambour cabinet. The piece features an array of high-quality joinery techniques including hand-cut half-blind dovetail joints, through mortise and tenon joints and hand-shaped drawer pulls.

Group Performance: The Human Kingdom, nominated for inclusion.

In an increasingly advanced world of communication, have we inadvertently become more disconnected? *The Human Kingdom* asks the audience to reflect on our earth's diverse animalia and question if our so-called 'primitive' counterparts might be more advanced than ourselves.

Walnut Entertainment Unit, nominated for inclusion.

James designed and constructed a small, sophisticated cabinet that can fit in the living room and replace the existing table. It has been designed to hide the wires and provide adequate storage space, while also fitting into the décor around his house. It features a range of woodworking skills and techniques including a through dovetailed carcase, book matched fiddleback panelling in the doors and pinned mortise and tenon joints in the frame.

The Old Man from the Sea, nominated for inclusion.

Angus paired a monochromatic charcoal portrait of his great uncle with vivid pastel depictions of a barnacle and a weathered boat. He intended for the pieces to act in unison as a visual anecdote, using the boat as a direct allusion to his great uncle's life as a sailor, and the barnacle as a reference to natural scarring. Angus incorporated his great uncle's scars into the natural cavities of each pastel piece, amalgamating the natural and human world.

Letter Desk. nominated for inclusion.

This small, drop-front letter desk was created to fit in the small corner of a living room and was inspired by the traditional woodworking approach of Michael Pekovich as well as the aesthetic personality of Germán Peraire. The construction features a through dovetailed carcase with stopped housing joints and two drawers sitting on a through mortise and tenoned standing frame.



Three nominations, one selection for creative Oscar

Oscar Tentij would have been delighted with one nomination for an HSC showcase or exhibition but his performance in Drama and Visual Arts was so good, he received three – plus a selection!

Oscar's HSC Visual Arts Body of Work, *Cladonia Rangiferina*, was selected for the ARTEXPRESS exhibition at Hazelhurst Arts Centre. Visual Arts Teacher and Concordia Curator Hannah Chapman said his 'original and ambitious work ... is the result of multiple powerful learning experiences in the Visual Arts department and Concordia Gallery.'

Oscar reflected on the process of creating *Cladonia Rangiferina*, 'I interrogated my Swedish heritage, highlighting how my connection to the culture has strengthened me. In the work, I have used moss that grows natively in the Swedish archipelago as an extended metaphor for my cultural connection to Sweden and a source of strength for others who have relied on the moss in the past. I also have memories of this moss during my childhood trips with my grandfather back to Sweden. I included information about the moss's history, medical constituencies, dietary properties, references in literature and cultural significance.'



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Fletcher receives recognition for fine craftmanship

Industrial Technology student Fletcher Hunt received a Highly Commended Award in the student category of Australian Wood Review's Maker of the Year Awards for his HSC Major Work. Fletcher's Tambour Desk, made from American walnut, American oak and ringed gidgee, was considered to be of a very high standard by the judges. The award winners and finalists were featured in the December 2022 issue of Australian Wood Review.

Fletcher's work is a shaker-style desk and accompanying tambour cabinet.

'My aim was to construct a large, traditional tapered-leg desk with an accompanying contemporary tambour storage module,' Fletcher said. 'The desk contradicts the traditional roll top desk, with the aim of the tambour door becoming a place to store stationery and other pieces without being seen, while the desk is still functional. The desk features double mortise and tenons, tapered legs, continuous grain drawer fronts, lathe-turned handles, sliding dovetails, waterfall mitres, Philip Morley halfblind dovetails, through housings and traditional drawer construction. All joinery used provides the function, detail and elegance that come with bespoke furniture.'

Fletcher's Industrial Technology teacher, Mr Joe Glover, said, 'Fletcher has been a dedicated and focused student for many years and has always approached woodwork with a keen interest and a real desire to understand the how and why of furniture joinery and design.

'He would continually go above and beyond with his work, researching and practising all the techniques, joints and skills that he needed to achieve what he set out to do.

'His patience and focus with his work were always impressive and his final project was beautifully constructed and finished. I am sure this his desk will be cherished and used for many years to come.'

Early entry a popular path to tertiary study

In 2022, in addition to studying for their exams, many Newington students were also contacting their preferred universities to explore their early entry options.

By November, of the 160 students who told us they applied for early entry, 88 per cent had already received at least one offer and some students received up to six.

Aiden Love and Rvan McPhail were both offered places at the prestigious Sydney Conservatorium of Music to study the double degree Bachelor of Music/Bachelor of Advanced Studies (Performance) through the early entry program.

Jeremy Webb also benefited from early entry, receiving a total of five offers. 'The early entries took considerable weight off my shoulders leading up to the HSC exams,'

he said. 'In the December UAC offer round I was offered admission to UNSW, which does not offer early entry. Instead, I am going to attend UTS which offered me early entry in September.'

In total, Newington students received 279 early entry offers. Head of Careers Mr Terence Priester says of the process, 'Early entry is one of the few avenues to university admission that considers you holistically, as a whole person, not just the marks you earned in Year 12. I am much more interested in seeing universities accept students who have the foresight and discipline to present their leadership, co-curricular and sport achievements along with a personal statement about themselves and their academic records for admission consideration.'
