The 2019 ATAR range of results


This chart shows the range of ATARs received by Newington College students across both the HSC and IB in 2019. The figures are calculated estimates and are accurate as of 31 January 2020.

Students receive their ATARs after completing the HSC or IB. The ATAR is a rank, rather than a mark, and is indicated by a number between 0 and 99.95.

It measures a student's overall performance in relation to the performance of other students. For example, an ATAR of 85.00 means a student has placed in the top 15% of students in their cohort.

ATARs are used by tertiary institutions to rank applicants as part of their candidate selection process.

What do you do when you're one of just 69 candidates worldwide who achieve a perfect score of 45 in the International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme?

If you're Angus Waldon, you do 'a bit of a happy dance'. Then you give your mum, who might be feeling a bit emotional, a big hug.

His result equates to an ATAR of 99.95.

'It was a pretty amazing feeling,' Angus said. 'I thought I'd probably get 44, so I was a bit shocked.'

Angus came to Newington College in Year 7 and says what set the school apart were the number of study and co-curricular options available, and the quality of the teachers.

'They're willing to give up their free time to look into things more deeply with you. It's an individual race, but if you didn't have that level of support from your teachers it would be a lot tougher,' he said.

Angus chose the IB because he liked its broad approach. His program spanned English, Latin,

History, Chemistry, Physics and Maths, backed by a 4000-word extended essay that delved into the impact of Napoleon on German unification in 1871.

'I really like looking into the past, looking at original sources and weighing up historians' perspectives. It's fascinating.'

His love of history spilled into other parts of his College life too. Angus was a senior warrant officer in the Newington Cadet Corp ('The Anzac tradition and the history Newington shares with the army – I found that really interesting') and says his final year cadet camp remains one of his favourite memories of Newington.

Angus plans to study medicine but might take a gap year first 'a little bit off the western Europe tourist route, travelling solo so I get a bit of personal growth as well'.

Advice from the experts

What does it take to succeed in the HSC or IB? This is what the Class of 2019 believe made the difference for them.

'I've really got to thank my mum and dad ... the opportunities I've had and the sacrifices they made. I'm really thankful.'

'I changed my study routine during the HSC. Instead of just studying in my room, I went down to my local park and sat on a park bench for two hours and did my study in the open.'

'My teachers have always been there for me. I also felt really motivated by having my friends around me - they're good influences on me.'

RICKY ZHENG

(HSC; ATAR 98.85)

'Ask your teachers for help they do so much. They'll go out of their way to sit down and do a full read-through of an assignment to help you.'

XAVIER PAPPS (IB; ATAR 95.45) 'I had to make a conscious decision to step up. I got a lot of help from the teachers and coaches. My parents helped as well.'

'Keep an open mind about the different avenues you could take with your assignments, because you do have to come up with original ideas. Plan well and stay committed.'

'Year 11 and 12 are a really big step up workload wise. With that increased workload comes a lot more stress and a lot more pressure, so make sure you have a lot of time for yourself to do things you like, whether it's co-curricular at school or time outside with your friends. For me that was very important.'

'I think using all the resources available to you is the most important thing, and the teachers are your best resource. I'd go and see my teacher during lunch time. He'd sit down and go through the questions I didn't get.'
